EXCEPTION TO STANDARD FORM 30

The purpose of this modification is to exercise Option I under the option provision of the subject contract; to correct the effective date and option dates to provide consistency throughout the contract document, and to revise the ceiling amount for the contract. Now therefore, the Government modifies the contract as follows:

Pursuant to contract clause H.2 OPTION TO EXTEND THE PERIOD OF THE CONTRACT-TIME AND MATERIALS AND LABOR HOUR CONTRACT, the Government now exercises Option Year I. The Contractor shall perform according to the terms and conditions, the services required through August 31, 1997.

## SECTION B - SUPPLIES OR SERVICES AND PRICES/COSTS

The Government with this modification increases the ceiling price of this contract to \$1,072,727.00.

Contract clause B.4 is hereby revised in accordance with the increase.

### B.4 CEILING PRICE

The ceiling price of this contract is \$1,072,727.00. The Contractor shall not make expenditures or incur obligations in the performance of this contract, which exceed the ceiling price specified herein, except at the Contractor's own risk.

In the Schedule of Prices, the prices identified under B.7 SCHEDULE OF PRICES - OPTION PERIOD I shall be in effect during September 1, 1996 through August 31, 1997.

### SECTION F - DELIVERIES OR PERFORMANCE

To provide consistency throughout the contract document, contract clause F.2 is revised as follows:

## F.2 EFFECTIVE PERIOD OF THE CONTRACT

The effective period of the contract is from the effective date of the contract through August 31, 1997.

### SECTION H - SPECIAL CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS

We revise contract clause H.2 to read as follows:

# H.2 OPTION TO EXTEND THE EFFECTIVE PERIOD OF THE CONTRACT-TIME AND MATERIALS OR LABOR HOUR CONTRACT

The Government has the option of extending the effective period of this contract for two (2) additional period(s). If more than thirty (30) days remain in the contract effective period, the Government, without prior written notification, may exercise this option by issuing a contract modification. To unilaterally exercise this option within the last thirty days of the effective period, the Government must issue written notification of its intent to exercise the option before that last thirty-day period. This preliminary notification does not commit the Government to exercise the option.

Exercise of an option will result in the following modification:

The "Ceiling Price" clause in Section B is modified to reflect new and separate ceiling prices for each respective option period as follows:

Option I \$1,072,727.00 Option II \$403,200.00

The "Effective Period of the Contract" clause (1352.212-74) is modified for each respective option period as follows:

### \*\* Fringe Benefits Required For All Occupations Included In This Wage Determination \*\*

HEALTH & WELFARE: \$0.90 per hour or \$36.00 per week or \$156.00 per month.

VACATION: Two weeks paid vacation after 1 year of service with a contractor or successor; 3 weeks after 5 years; 4 weeks after 15 years. Length of service includes the whole span of continuous service with the present contractor or successor, wherever employed, and with the predecessor contractor in the performance of similar work at the same Federal facility. (Reg. 4.173)

HOLIDAYS: Minimum of ten paid holidays per year: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. (A contractor may substitute for any of the named holidays another day off with pay in accordance with a plan communicated to the employees involved.) (See 29 CFR 4.174)

- Does not apply to employees employed in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity as defined and delineated in 29 CFR 541. (See 29 CFR 4.156)
- APPLICABLE TO WEATHER OBSERVERS ONLY NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you work at night as a part of a regular tour of duty, you will earn a NIGHT DIFFERENTIAL and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employee (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek, you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

### \*\* UNIFORM ALLOWANCE \*\*

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract, by

the employer, by the state or local law, etc.), the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition, where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee, all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount, or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost), reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$4.25 per week (or \$.85 cents per day). However, in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of "wash and wear" materials, may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments, and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning, daily washing, or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract, by the contractor, by law, or by the nature of the work, there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

### \*\* NOTES APPLYING TO THIS WAGE DETERMINATION \*\*

Source of Occupational Titles and Descriptions:

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations," Fourth Edition, January 1993, as amended by First Supplement December 1993, unless otherwise indicated. This publication may be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, at 202-783-3238, or by writing to the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. Copies of specific job descriptions may also be obtained from the appropriate contracting officer.

REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE {Standard Form 1444 (SF 1444)}

### Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e., the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination), be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e., appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination. Such conformed classes of employees shall be paid the monetary wages and furnished the fringe benefits as are determined. Such conforming process shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees. The conformed classification, wage rate, and/or fringe benefits shall be retroactive to the

commencement date of the contract. {See Section 4.6 (C)(vi)} When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract, a separate SF 1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

- 1) When preparing the bid, the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).
- 2) After contract award, the contractor prepares a written report listing in order proposed classification title(s), a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s), job description(s), and rationale for proposed wage rate(s), including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved, or where there is no authorized representative, the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.
- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, for review. (See section 4.6(b)(2) of Regulations 29 CFR Part 4).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer; or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour decision to the contractor.
- 6) The contractor informs the affected employees.

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF 1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request, the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations" (the Directory) should be used to compare job definitions to insure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination.

- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, for review. (See section 4.6(b)(2) of Regulations 29 CFR Part 4).
  - 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer, or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
  - 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour decision to the contractor.
  - 6) The contractor informs the affected employees.

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF 1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request, the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations" (the Directory) should be used to compare job definitions to insure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination.

This modification is issued as a modification beyond the scope of the initial 8(a) contract award. It increases the ceiling price for the base year and two option years of the contract from \$2,999,352.00 to \$5,500,000.00. In accordance with CFR 124.318(c), it is determined that Systems Integration, Inc. is still an 8(a) Program Participant and is still a small business under SIC Code 7373 for this requirement. It is further determined that the estimated fair market value of the new requirement falls below the applicable threshold of \$3,000.000. The new requirement is an integral part of the existing services and it would not be in the best interest of the Government to have different contractors providing the services to implement an enterprise call center for the Patent and Trademark Office.

In addition, this modification issues a Change Order which makes a change to the specifications. These changes are issued in accordance with FAR 52-243.3 CHANGES - TIME AND MATERIALS OR LABOR HOURS. Now, therefore the contract is modified as follows:

### SECTION B - SUPPLIES OR SERVICES AND PRICES/COSTS

The Government with this modification increases the ceiling price of this contract to \$5,500,000.00.

Contract clause B.4 is hereby revised in accordance with the increase.

### B.4 CEILING PRICE

The ceiling price of this contract is \$5,500,000.00 (base period, Option I and Option II). The Contractor shall not make expenditures or incur obligations in the performance of this contract, which exceed the ceiling price specified herein, except at the Contractor's own risk.

### SECTION C - DESCRIPTION/SPECIFICATIONS/WORK STATEMENT

Section C.3 SCOPE is revised to read as follows:

### C.3 SCOPE

The scope of this contract is to provide the Government with a system which will provide the Patent and Trademark Office (PTO) with an enterprise wide call center infrastructure which will serve the needs of the General Information Services Division (GISD) agents and the PTO's telephone customers which they serve. This shall include, but not be limited to, basic building block components and an overall plan [including such things as a cost analysis, cost estimates, personnel requirements, and a plan for any subcontracting] for a turnkey system. The plans shall address provision of, or recommendations for, purchase; timing of purchase; design; installation; production; testing; implementation; maintenance; software licenses required; warranty of the required software, firmware, groupware, hardware; evaluation and delivery of the overall system; manuals; and the training of staff for integrating the functions and infrastructure into the GISD operation and bringing all necessary remote call centers online with the infrastructure. Given the complexity, volume, and level of sophistication required for the new Enterprise Call Center (ECC) infrastructure, the contractor is no longer required to utilize the existing Executone equipment.

### SECTION H - SPECIAL CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS

Contract clause H.2 is hereby revised to read as follows:

# H.2 OPTION TO EXTEND THE EFFECTIVE PERIOD OF THE CONTRACT—TIME AND MATERIALS OR LABOR HOUR CONTRACT

The Government has the option of extending the effective period of this contract for two (2) additional period(s). If more than thirty (30) days remain in the contract effective period, the Government, without prior written notification, may exercise this option by issuing a contract modification. To unilaterally exercise this option within the last thirty days of the effective period, the Government must issue written notification of its intent to exercise the option before that last thirty-day period. This preliminary notification does not commit the Government to exercise the option.

Exercise of an option will result in the following modification:

The "Ceiling Price" clause in Section B is modified to reflect new and separate ceiling prices for each respective option period as follows:
